
Leinen, said, "It was a wonderful award, I was very humbled





To qualify, the burger must be a 100% beef patty or patties, although other ingredients may be added such as spices, and served on a bun or bread product. Burgers may include any combination of condiments, sauces, cheese or toppings.

"We moved all of the voting to online this year and set a new record with over 700 restaurants receiving at least one nomination," said Brooke German, director of marketing for the Iowa Beef Industry Council. 

#### **Cattle operation**

Leinen actively began working with cattle in 1984 when he married DeeDee Greiner and they moved to his new home west of Panama.

"That year I bought seven cow-calf pairs that year for \$500 a pair to get my operation started (current value approx. \$1,800 a pair)," he said.

That same year he started a farrow-tofinish hog operation. But in 1994, when he and DeeDee were planning to move to his parents' farm home he chose to get out of hogs, and prepare exclusively to operate a cow-calf operation when they made the move in 1995. His father, the late Bernie Leinen, had a long standing 50 head cow-calf operation and Leinen said it made for an easy transition.

Leinen has a predominantly Angus operation with five bulls, 92 cows and 94 calves with two sets of twins.

Leinen said, "This season was particularly tough with three breech births and happily all three calves survived along with their mothers. It all depends on how comfortable you are doing this as to whether you seek support from a veterinarian or friends -- fortunately with these breech births, I was able to handle the births by myself. I've been in this situation enough times that experience weighs in."

"During the roughly 45-day calving season you are constantly checking the herd, at least every three to four hours, which puts a dent in seeing the grandchildren or traveling very far for events."

Aside from his cow-calf operation he farms and raises corn, beans and hay, so the Leinens don't slow down very long. DeeDee, an RN in Omaha, helps the farming operation where she can, and devotes a large part of her life to local volunteer projects and helping with the grandchildren.

#### Volunteering even as a pastor

Leinen got his volunteer spiritual side not only through St. Mary's Catholic Church but he became an ordained minister of the Universal Life Church which allowed him to preside over the weddings of nephew Keith and Gabby Leinen and also a nephew in Texas. Both wanted outdoor weddings and the churches didn't allow them, so the work-around was to have Steve preside at their weddings.

DeeDee said it was 1996 when she and Steve got involved in helping the local 4-H chapter.

"The kids would go down and watch Frank Cogdill wash cattle, and he would ask the kids why don't you kids get involved with 4-H -- so that is how our family started with the then Washington Wolverines which is now part of the merged Northwest Leaders," she said.

The couple were 4-H leaders for 11 years and would hold "mock" cattle shows on their property to teach the kids the nuances of showing calves, which also helped prepare the cattle for the experience of being in a show ring, and being guided in and out of the mock staging areas.

"Frank Cogdill and another volunteer would be judges and give the kids tips and pointers about proper showing cattle techniques and that's how the club grew. Often our entire club would fill half the Shelby Co. Fair's cattle barn," Leinen said.

Between the two of them they have served on 11 different volunteer boards, they've eased off on some organizations but still remain very involved and Steve still finds time to help Dick Schwery Construc-

The Leinens' extensively remodeled home circa 1893 home is adjacent to the railroad tracks a block east off Hwy 191 in Panama. In 1969, his parents Bernie and Helen and family moved into the home and it wasn't until 1995 when Steve and DeeDee took over the home that they real-

# Friday, June 29, 2018 deadline at Shelby Co. Extension Office

HEIFER SCHOLARS - These winners were recognized at the 2017 Shelby County Fair Auction and to date, 23 youth have started in the cattle industry in Shelby County through this loan program. \$7,500 was awarded to each of the 2016 recipients with \$1,500 being a scholarship and \$6,000 being a non-interest loan.

- · Must be entering 7th, 8th or 9th grade at the time the application is due, along with three recommendation letters are required.
- · Recipient must be interested in agriculture and willing to accept total responsibility for the daily care of the heifers
- The recipient must maintain an accurate report of income, expenditures, health protocols and records, as well as calving records during the five years. The recipient will be asked to submit these records plus a brief summary of activities annually.
- The recipient(s) will receive scholarship towards the purchase of five first calf heifers.
- The amount distributed to the recipient may change from year to year if scholarship amounts change.
- If the purchase price of the heifers exceeds the amount given by the Shelby County Cattlemen, the recipient and recipient's parent/guardian is responsible for that amount.
- The first year of the program, which begins April 15th following the announcement of the winner, the recipient is not required to pay any money back to the Cattlemen. This is considered the scholarship portion of the program. On April 15 of the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th year, the recipient is required to pay back 20% of the original amount given. This is considered the interest free loan part of the program.
- The recipient must submit an invoice/verification of heifer ownership. Ownership of heifers must be obtained by April 15th following the announcement of the recipient. The Shelby County Cattlemen will have a security interest in the cattle and have the right to obtain and sell them if there was ever a problem.
- Shelby County Cattlemen reserve the right of an annual inspection of animals and facilities used.

## What cattle eat for dinner!

The fact is that just like humans...a healthy, balanced diet includes simple carbohydrates that can be provided by a variety of sources, and in rare cases include candy or other sweets. Molasses, for example, has been used as a simple carbohydrate in cattle rations for a long time.

Unlike humans, cattle have a complex (or four-part) digestive system that includes the rumen, where beneficial microorganisms help digest their food. Cattle are uniquely able to turn a variety of feed ingredients or unusable byproducts into the nutrients they need to grow and be healthy.


Based on the geographic region of the country where the cattle are raised, the feed may also include locally grown products that otherwise would be sent to landfills or burned and would go to waste.

For example, in California, cattle might consume almond hulls as part of their ration, while cattle in Idaho might have potato starch remaining from making hash browns or fries mixed into their ration.

There is great diversity in what is locally available and cattlemen take advantage of the existing natural resources in their geographic regions and transform these resources into great-tasting, nutritious beef consumers love.




